Fasks Identified in the Weed and Seed Application How can you Help?

- Eliminate drug traffiking and operations in our neighborhood

....Involve at least 200 residents in a block-by-block/door-to-door survey to increase awareness of problems and solutions.

.... Institute grassroots-based block watch efforts.

.... Contact absentee landlords and other owners of property that is the site of drug activity.

.... Work with neighborhood schools, businesses, churches., service providers, and other groups to develop and implement intervention programs for at-risk youth.

.... Work with parents/guardians of students involved with drugs alcohol, and/or weapons.

.... Work to prevent the increase in the number of liquor licenses in the neighborhood.

....Help develop a mandated out-of-school suspension program to keep suspended students off the streets and out of trouble.

.... Establish a program to discourage truant and at-risk behavior.

.... Work to develop and implement community work service opportunities.

.... Explore the feasibility of the formation of an in-school youth court for school offenses.

Establish a Family Center to offer referrals and programs for families.

....Provide classes in parenting, anger management and conflict resolution.

....Help provide after-hours indoor recreational opportunities for children and adults that encourage teamwork, creativity and success in school.
