### WELCOME & APPROVE AGENDA, MINUTES

- The meeting was called to order at 6:33 p.m. Approximately 25-30 people (members and guests) attended.
- The April agenda was reviewed.
  - Motion by Cathy Gleason to approve the agenda. Second by Carolyn Hall.
  - The agenda was approved without objection
- TCC Regular Meeting Minutes May 5, 2022, were reviewed
  - Motion by Cathy Gleason to approve the minutes. Second by Pat Redmond
  - The minutes were approved without objection

  - Th Parks Dept is doing brush clearing along the Coastal Trail
  - *Music in the Park* by the Anchorage Downtown Partnership (ADP) is back this year. ADP reached out to see whether TCC is aware of any conflicts at Turnagain-area parks that ADP is considering using for musical events.

## Questions and Comments

- Cathy Gleason: the MOA has an ordinance in place that limits some of the activity by the airport in the area in question regarding moving the ATC. Can we look into this and get a legal opinion regarding the airport complying with the MOA code?
  - Answer: Airport claims they are not subject to MOA ordinances, only to SOA law. Rep. Claman is looking into whether the MOA code applies.
- Pat Redmond echoes Cathy's question/concern.

# ASSEMBLY REPORT | KAMERON PEREZ-VERDIA

- There's an emergency burn ban in place that makes it a criminal violation
- There's a special election coming up (June 21) for North Anchorage. This is a by-mail election.
- The Assembly is developing a process to determine federal funding allocation for COVID relief. The focus is on long-term economic recovery
- Mass-care exit from the Sullivan Arena. The Sully will close as a shelter on June 30. There is a plan in place to find housing/shelter for clients using the services at the Sullivan Arena.
- Gave an update on the recent Assembly meeting that included public testimony regarding the proposed code on removing a mayor for breach of public trust
- Public Safety and Health Policy Committee updates

### • Questions and Comments

- Dave Weir: Do you believe in a balance of power, and does this proposed AO offer balance, or is it maladjusted? KPV: yes, he believes in the balance of power. The process of removing an elected official is pretty normal. This proposed AO doesn't establish power, it describes the process for how that power would be exercised, if ever necessary. Dave: why should the Assembly have the power to remove the mayor when the mayor can't remove someone from the Assembly? KPV: I still have outstanding questions about the AO, which is why I haven't decided how I'm going to vote. Anna Brawley: the TCC doesn't have a position on the AO.
- Cathy Gleason: HLB is there an intent to contract out this work? It would appear that the HLB is being dismantled. KPV: He'll look into this.

# ANCHORAGE SCHOOL BOARD REPORT | MARGO BELLAMY

- Updates re: end of school year, graduations, summer school, School Board executive board elections

- TCC will have a new school board member representative at the next TCC meeting.

## • Questions and Comments

• Pat Redmond: has there been discussion re: putting the school bond that failed back on the ballot? Margo: an internal study was conducted, and the board received the results and will discuss the results at the work session on Monday. Formal discussions have yet to take place.

• Cathy Gleason: thank you, Margo, for attending the TCC meetings. Shares appreciation for her work and participation.

# AIRPORT REPORT | JOHN JOHANSEN

- Shares updates re: airport construction (escalator from the terminal to the parking garage, curbside rehab, etc.), communications with nearby residents that PFAS contamination well testing is taking place, wildlife is abundant on the Coastal Trail right now (bears, moose, and their offspring), Lake Hood Seaplane Base (keep your dogs leashed), international flights (Vancouver, Germany), and air cargo updates.
- General aviation's new parking site will include a realignment of Lake Hood Drive.

#### • Questions and Comments

- John Haxby: does the well testing have anything to do with deicing agents? John: Well testing has nothing to do with deicing chemicals. It has to do with other compounds, which are commonly found in other industrial and home products. John: wouldn't it make sense to test for the deicing agents? John: there are no plans to test for this chemical at this time.
- Cathy Gleason: mentions the lease applications, the request to meet with the acting director, and thoughts about the contamination in the bog from airport runoff. John: there are high costs associated with moving/disturbing contaminated soil.

#### **New Business**

# • Presentation: Expansion of ACS Broadband (Fiber) Service, Heather Cavanaugh, ACS

• Fiber optic is coming to the neighborhood. Speeds up to 2.2 GB. This comes at no additional cost and minimal disruption. Fiber will be installed underground (micro trenching) and does not entail large ditches.

### Questions and Comments

• Anna Brawley: when could the service be available? Heather: construction starts as early as tomorrow. Anna: Please share this timeline info with FCC for wider distribution

# • Update: Fish Creek Trail to Ocean Project Update, CRW

- o CRW representative wasn't able to make the meeting
- Anna Brawley: TCC Executive Board plans to hold a site survey of the proposed trail areas. If anyone is interested in joining (date TBD), please let Anna know.
- Brian Lindamood (AKRR): the project is hearing concerns from homeowners about the two ROW possibilities at the edge of their properties. There's nothing formal to be evaluated at this time.

#### Ouestions and Comments

- Jon Isaacs: we may want to schedule a special meeting for a presentation about the ROW and proposed trail this summer instead of waiting until the September meeting.
- John Haxby: the AKRR's position is that it's ok having the bike trail on the east side of the RR tracks? Brian: From a technical perspective, yes, that would work if the designers can make it work. John: is there any reason there could be issues with

- the bike trail connection over NL Blvd? [note: missed part of this question] Brian: without having a design in front of me, it's hard to know.
- Cathy Gleason: What part of the AKRR right of way is fenced in right now? Would the trail exist on the inside or outside of the fence: Brian: there are three fences; describes fence locations and where the trail could end up.
- Anna: further discussion can be brought up when the council meets on this particular topic, and the stakeholders are prepared.

#### OLD BUSINESS

- Action: Approve TCC proposed 2023 CIP Priorities, CIP Committee
  - Brief introduction by Chair Brawley
  - Cathy Gleason discussed the rationale behind the CIP Committee's work
  - Pat Redmond moves to approve the CIP list as it has been presented. Sara Haley seconds.
  - Pat Redmond moves to amend to add resurfacing of West Northern Lights multi-use trail, from Forest Park Dr. to Earthquake Park parking lot. (Worst stretches are Nathaniel Ct. to Earthquake Park, and then Turnagain St. to Forest Park Dr.) Sara Haley seconds.
    - Comment: Jon Isaacs suggests adding these amendments to the bottom of the CIP list. There is no objection.
  - CIP list is passed, approved, and adopted 13-0.
  - The CIP list will be submitted by the MOA's deadline of June 15
- **Action:** Approve Recommendation re: Muni parcels (W. Northern Lights/Turnagain St.) proposed ordinance AO 2022-21.
  - Chair Brawley shares a summary introduction ahead of the resolution discussion
  - Pat Redmond moves to adopt the draft resolution as presented. Jon Isaacs seconds.
  - Chair Brawley shares a summary of the draft resolution.
  - Jon Isaacs: this is a multi-part process, and we should keep that in mind with this resolution because some items may be premature in the process.
  - Cathy Gleason has ten amendments to propose for the resolution.
  - Kameron Perez-Verdia: Austin Quinn-Davidson is unavailable for the Assembly meeting this AO will be discussed/voted on. KPV will help with amendments during the meeting. The work the TCC put into the resolution is what he was hoping to see. He feels comfortable referencing the resolution and offering amendments. The Assembly feels strongly about additional housing. The Assembly vote is likely to move forward with the sale. KPV remains neutral on the issue but would like to see responsibly built housing in Anchorage. The resolution helps represent the neighborhood.
  - Chair Brawley brings up a time check. Cathy Gleason motions to extend the meeting to
    9:20 p.m. Pat Redmond seconds. There is no objection.
  - Discussion continues
    - Emily Nenon asks a question about the traffic study mentioned in #5.
  - Cathy Gleason moves to add "Turnagain Community Council" to #4. Second by Dan Gleason. Vote fails 4 - 4
  - KPV: needs to leave the meeting and says if there are substantive amendments, he wants to know about them.
  - Discussion continues
    - Emily Nenon asks about the availability of parking and possibly requiring housing to be available for certain demographics.

#### **Turnagain Community Council**

- Cathy Gleason moves to amend #5 to include language that the Municipality will retain ownership and maintain the vegetative buffer landscaping. Dan Gleason seconds.
   Amendment fails 4 - 4.
- Cathy Gleason moves to amend #1 to include "eastern most 5" and "as well as assure permanent emergency vehicle access at the Barbara Street turnaround." Dan Gleason seconds. Amendment fails 4 4.
- A vote on the resolution passed 9 0; Chair Brawley abstained.
- If anyone has additional comments for the Assembly, contact KPV to share your thoughts

### **CLOSING**

- Pat Redmond motions to end the meeting, and Carolyn Hall seconds. Motion passed and the meeting was adjourned at 9:21 p.m.
